

### Upholds Condemnation Of Social Mingling Of Races

Austin, Tex., July 8.—Governor Moody today approved in part and disapproved in part the concurrent resolution passed by the Texas legislature condemning Mrs. Herbert Hoover, wife of the President of the United States, for entertaining the wife of a negro congressman at a white house tea.

"Any part of this resolution which may be reasonably construed as a personal criticism of the wife of the president of the United States of America does not have my approval and I decline to have any part in it," he said in a statement filed in the document department of the secretary of state's office.

Referring to a section of the resolution which reminded southern democrats who voted for the republican presidential nominee that they had been cautioned just such incidents as the one condemned might happen, the governor said:

"Recognizing the right of every citizen to vote his own convictions, I do not assert the right to officially upbraid any because they exercise the liberty to hold and vote views different from mine, nor do I approve any attempt at official criticism of any citizen's vote."

The resolution had his "heartily approval" insofar as "it condemns customs that bring the two races into contact, upon the same social plane," he stated.

"Any mingling of the races upon a basis of social equality is intolerable and no precedent can justify it," he said. "The ill effects of acts tending toward equal social recognition between the races are thoroughly demonstrated by the recent contemptible public utterance made before mixed audiences by the negro whose wife was the recipient of the invitation mentioned in the resolution."

### Thinks Cleveland Can Do Without Farm Demonstrator

#### With Easy Communication And Agriculture Taught In Public Schools.

To Editor of The Star: In reference to the resignation of our county farm demonstrator, I wish to make a few statements which I would appreciate your printing in a near issue of your paper.

Let me state in the beginning that my remarks are not intended with any reflection upon the general idea of agricultural enlightenment, or upon the work that has been done in Cleveland county through the demonstrators or home extension agent's offices. There has been a time when the office of either of these agents was an asset to a county. When means of communication between the farming people and the sources of information at Raleigh and Washington were not as frequent and convenient as they are today, and when the rural schools were still functioning at a very low rate of progress, the county agents filled a place that could not otherwise be taken care of.

The improvement between our state and national departments and the private citizen places the entire research work of these agencies within easy reach of the farmer. Any information compiled by the government is published in bulletin form and awaits distribution for the asking.

The main reason, however, why the offices of farm agent and home extension agents are to be rendered ineffective in a progressive county is the fact that the people in rural sections are fast coming to the point of having agriculture, as a scientific subject, taught in the public schools.

It is an indisputable fact that a youthful mind can bring home and present logical reasoning and information much better than can one outside of the family. The vocational work in the rural schools is rapidly expanding, and in our own county it has almost expanded to the point where we have two overlapping means of instruction, both of which are taking a portion of the taxpayers money.

The vocational instructor in the public schools receives the same aid, both as to information and financial assistance that the farm and extension agents receive. In like manner the home extension work in the county is very rapidly being absorbed by the home economics department in the rural schools. No instructor or agent, regardless of educational qualifications, can present a new fact to a housekeeper, with as much results as can a daughter of the house.

I believe it would be a distinct forward step and in keeping with the agricultural progress of Cleveland county, if our county commissioners lend their aid to the teaching of agriculture and home economics in all the rural schools instead of maintaining a central office in the county seat which cannot possibly have the direct contact that results from teaching these subjects to the youthful mind of the school pupil.

In further reference to the rural schools, I am looking forward to the time when we can make them a direct agency for the conservation of human life through the practical teaching of health and disease preventatives. A school equipped with health demonstration facilities and rendering practical assistance to children will accomplish a need, the value of which could not be valued in money.

We have made rapid progress in all the material things of this county. Why not make it one of the pioneer counties to encourage the maximum of practical teaching in the schools to the children who must later be the citizens of the county?

### Is Refused Car; Youth Ends Life

Lancaster, S. C.—Because his father, R. E. Kennington, refused him the use of his car for a fishing trip, Leroy Kennington, 22, cursed his parents and committed suicide in Lancaster county yesterday afternoon about 5 o'clock. A load from a shotgun, fired into his body just above his heart, proved instantly fatal.

A coroner's jury, headed by W. J. Small, coroner, rendered a verdict of suicide at 8 o'clock.

Young Kennington, according to his family, had been drinking yesterday afternoon, and came to his father with the request for the car. He was refused. Leaving the Kennington home he returned in about half an hour and cursed his father and mother.

Then he went to the home of his grandfather, 500 yards distant, where he had been staying for the last seven months. His grandfather, on the front porch, heard the report of the gun shortly after. Kennington was found dead.
