Electric Refrigerators Sold Here Cannot Result In Poison

Poison gas from electric refrigerators reported to have caused the death of several persons in Chicago recently, cannot result from machines of the type distributed in Shelby a survey revealed yesterday.

Electric refrigerators causing trouble in the "Windy City" use methyl chloride gas, it was learned, while Frigidaires, Kelvinators and General Electric machines, the three types sold here, operate on sulphur dioxide, which is harmless unless inhaled in large quantities. Sulphur dioxide, which is used extensively in preserving fruit, has a pungent odor, and can be detected immediately, whereas methyl chloride is odorless.

"Electric machines sold in Shelby are absolutely safe in every respect," a dealer said yesterday, and there is no cause for alarm in connection with the Chicago case. Machines giving trouble there are entirely different from the three makes sold here."

Poles Fought as Enemies During World War Service

Plane Crash First Casualty of Their Lengthy Association

TWELVE years ago—such are the inexplicable antics of Fate—two Polish fliers, deadly enemies of the air over the Eastern Front, were fighting fiercely to bring to each other separately the catastrophe that overtook them together, as comrades of peace.

Up until a few days ago these two seemed to bear charmed lives. They fought through the war as enemies. Each was decorated for bravery. Then they joined their luck and their skill and fought side by side against the Bolsheviks until 1921.

The death of Major Leon Idzikowski and the severe injury to his comrade, Major Casimir Kubala, in their attempted flight to Mitchell Field, L. I., were the first casualties of that long and strange association.

Major Idzikowski was thirty-eight. Before the outbreak of the war, in 1914, he was a student at Polytechnical Institute, Liege, Belgium, the city that was so soon to enter upon its own tragic days. Although by nationality and choice a Pole, he was drafted into the Russian army.

He was called to mobilization in 1913, and in 1915 was transferred to the Aeronautic Service. Fighting on the Eastern Front, he was decorated several times by Russia.

Major Casimir Kubala is considered the foremost aviator and observer in Polish military aviation. He is a graduate of the Chemistry Department of the Jagiellonian University of Cracow.

In 1914 Major Kubala, also a Pole, but a resident at that time of Austrian Poland, was drafted into the Austrian army. He was trans-

ferred to the aeronautic service in 1916.

At the start of the war with the Bolsheviks in 1918 when the influence of Germany, Austria and Russia had lifted from divided and war-torn Poland, Major Idzikowski enlisted in the seventh squadron of sharpshooters and went to the front. He was a member of the famous "Kuchusko Escadrille," an American unit commanded by Colonel Cedric Fauntleroy of Chicago.
