

Mammoth Whisky Barroom Seized.

New York—A bar almost one block long, reputed the biggest in New York, was in the hands of federal prohibition authorities today.

The establishment, known as the Green Room Grill, was said to have opened only recently. It was located in an apparently vacant loft building in West 48th street, and the bar extended almost to the next street.

About 150 men were lined up along its brass rail as six federal agents forced an entrance after arresting the doorman. The agents also arrested the bartender and said they seized twenty barrels of

beer, a dozen cases of whisky and several baskets filled with assorted cordials. The bar was dismantled and carried away by the agents as evidence.

Cheese Plant Goes To Ashe.

Raleigh—A cheese factory and milk condensery to cost approximately \$100,000 will be erected at West Jefferson, in Ashe county, within the next 60 days by the Kraft-Phoenix Cheese corporation. It was learned from F. R. Farnham, dairy extension specialists of State college, on his return from West Jefferson where plans for the plant were discussed.

Options have already been secured on two plots of ground near West Jefferson, and \$10,000 worth of machinery has already arrived for installation as soon as the buildings are completed. Present plans call for the erection of two units, one for the manufacture of cheese and powdered whey and the second unit, to be erected later to handle sweet cream and powdered skim milk.

Construction on the new plant is expected to begin not later than August 1, and when completed will be the largest of its kind in the South.
