YOUTH MADE TO EXCAVATE OWN GRAVE

Mexico City—Newspaper dispatches from Colima published Thursday told how a fourteen-year old Mexican boy, Adolfo Villaneuva, was forced to dig his own grave before he was executed by Manuel Marmolejo, bandit chieftain. Marmolejo's band had captured the boy several weeks ago but he had managed to escape. He was taken again a few days ago and carried to the mountain retreat of the bandits where the leader ordered him to dig a grave, telling him it was for a man who was sentenced to death. As the task was finished the bandit said to the youth: "The grave you have dug is your own. You will not escape again." Marmolejo thereupon drew his pistol and shot the boy, the body falling back into the grave.

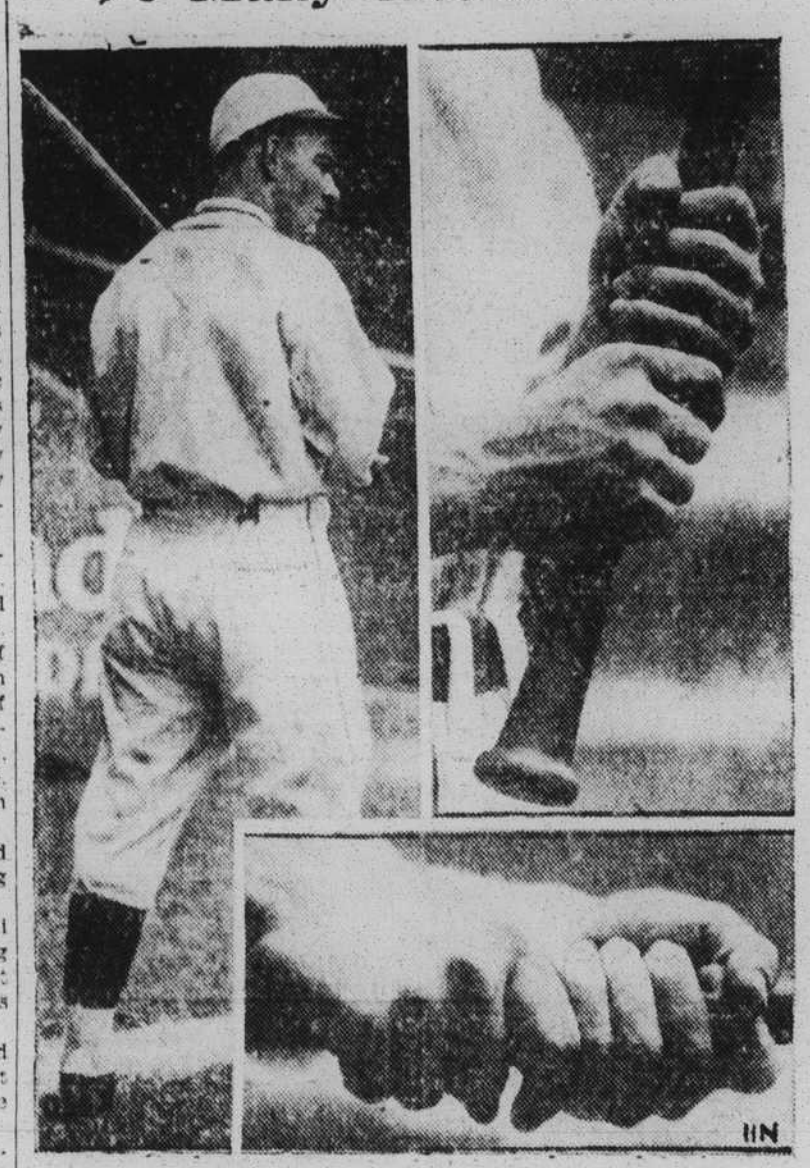
