Tobacco curing and grading has now begun in earnest in all parts of the state. Growers are encouraged by the good prices prevailing on the Georgia markets.



RECEIVERSHIP FOR MILL IS SOUGHT

Gastonia.—How to get a court order signed when there is no judge around handy was the problem that confronted attorneys here this afternoon when the Catawba Spinning company, of Mount Holly, sought the appointment of a temporary receiver to take over its affairs. Attorney E. A. Woltz, representing the corporation, R. F. Craig, vice president and C. H. Potter, secretary, the last named stated to be named receiver, had the necessary papers all in readiness at the courthouse then the question of getting the order properly signed came up. Judge Thomas G. Shaw, now holding court in this district, is away for two weeks. Judge Harding of Charlotte, resident judge, is holding court in another district. Judge M. V. Barnhill, of Rocky Mount, has been appointed by Governor Gardner to hold a special term of court here beginning next Monday for the trial of the strike murder cases, but his commission is not on file here and no one knew whether his appointment was limited to that particular case or not. Hence the papers are not yet signed. It is probable, however, that the papers will be signed tonight or in the morning.

The receivership is sought by the LoLa Manufacturing company, of Stanley, a creditor. It is understood that the mill's financial difficulties resulted from a heavy loss in cotton sustained several years ago which was gradually being overcome when the failure of the Commercial Bank and Trust company, in April, added to its embarrassments. The corporation's liabilities are said to be about \$167,000 with only about \$37,000 good assets, the real value, however, being estimated at \$175,000.
