Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Ingram and son, W. P., Jr., are spending the week-end with relatives at Morven.

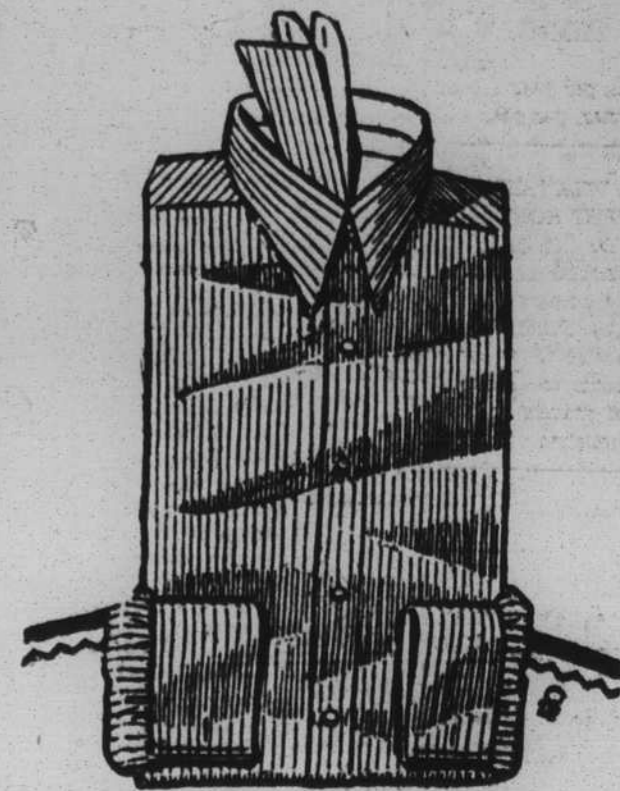
