Monroe Enquirer: A Shelby dispatch states that "the next city election in Shelby may fail to measure up to those city political battles of the past which have interested all of North Carolina."

Further reading discloses the fact that Shelby's city fathers in past years have been receiving free water, free lights and free telephone privileges, and these petty grafts are to be discontinued.

While comparisons are said to be odious, and sometimes odiferous, it may be said that Monroe aldermen do not receive free lights, water and telephone service but they do pay themselves enough salary to compensate for the lack of it.

Before the last legislature met I was greatly concerned and so stated, that the number of Monroe's aldermen be reduced to three and that the salary be reduced to a minimum. So long as Monroe pays five aldermen \$30 a month each, just so long will men seek the place for that \$30 a month.
