Terrorism Active In North Carolina

Governor Gardner in the statement which he made public Saturday night declared that "irrespective of its source or the occasion there is no place in North Carolina for terrorism in any form." That is what we would all like to believe but the fact remains that a campaign of terrorism does exist in North Carolina and that it is getting steadily worse.

It was claimed for the mob of Monday night that it began more or less spontaneously, that in its inception it was a "boyish" affair with no planned effort at violence. No such claim can be made for Saturday night's mob. It was plainly prearranged. It meant business.

Stirred to action by the ever-soaring figures on traffic deaths, the traffic committee of the American Road Builders' association is sponsoring its third annual highway safety campaign.

A survey is being made with a view to ascertaining what remedies might be most effective in halting this fearful loss of human lives. It has been found, according to the association, that proper measures for safety are going into the building of highways and of vehicles to operate over them, and that the greater blame, as in all previous investigations, must be laid at the door of the reckless driver and the unwary pedestrian.

Beyond any question, too, Gastonia has deliberately courted what is now happening. Its responsible leadership has openly encouraged this mob violence. No voice has been raised against it, at least none that has been able to make itself heard. The theme has been that these Communist agitators are an utter nuisance, that the community is sick to death of them, and that if they stay on they will stay at their peril.

DEATH IN AUTO CRASHES INCREASE

Total For First Seven Months Of Year In United States Is 15,000.

Washington—An average of more than three deaths in the United States every hour of every day in July was caused by motor vehicle accidents. This in the face of the myriad safety factors that are built into and that surround the modern highway and city street.

Representative states report about 35 serious non-fatal accidents to each fatality. On that basis, more than one-half million persons can be estimated as the toll of serious injuries in traffic thus far in 1929. Based on the studies of costs of motor vehicle accidents made by the statistics committee of the National Conference on Street and Highway Safety, a conservative figure of the cost of highway accidents for this year will reach above \$1,000,000,000.

Consulting the national safety council figures for July, it is found that pedestrian deaths continue to lead the list of traffic fatalities, taking 54 per cent of the total number. Thirty-seven per cent of these pedestrians were children under 15 years of age.

The American Road Builders' association believes in furthering and increasing the education of children along highway safety lines. It is heartily in favor of school lessons, drills and plays on the subject, of school-boy patrols and of all other methods that will instill caution into youthful minds.

Chicago's Example. Not the sort of education that will break down youthful spirits by thoughts of constant danger, but the development of ingrained caution, such as that which keeps a child away from a red hot stove.

Sow Cover Crops Between Rows

Should Wait Until After The First Picking. Same Method For Corn.

It is unnecessary to wait until the corn and cotton crops have been harvested to plant cover crops. Simply sow the seed between the rows in early fall and cover lightly.

Cover crops for soil improvement may be planted in corn and cotton fields with less trouble than anywhere else on the farm," says E. C. Blair, extension agronomist at State college. "If the cotton stalks are not large, crimson clover and vetch may be planted anytime after September 1. All that is necessary is to broadcast the seed and cover them. The ordinary cultivator is suitable when sowing vetch seed but for crimson clover, the cultivator should have fine teeth so as to cover the seed lightly."

If the cotton has grown large and dense, it is better to wait until immediately after the first picking before sowing the cover crop. This will avoid damage to the lower bolls. After the first picking, some of the cotton leaves will have fallen off, giving the young clover and vetch plants a chance to grow. Too much shade will kill them, as will too much hot sunshine, says Mr. Blair.

Mr. Blair says that this same method may be followed in corn fields. Sow cover crop seed early in September if the corn is not too rank. It is not worth while to sow vetch and crimson clover in those corn fields where there is a heavy crop of late-growing soybeans such as the Biloxi variety. The ground will be shaded until too late for the winter crop to make growth. However, vetch may be sown in such fields immediately after frost.

The proper rate of seeding vetch or crimson clover is 25 pounds an acre. If the land is not already inoculated, one must inoculate the seed and cover as directed. Neglect to do either of these two things is to invite failure in the venture.

HIGHWAY TRAFFIC BEATS ALL SEPTEMBER RECORDS

Asheville—Western North Carolina highways have drawn more out of state cars this month than in any preceding September in history. It was disclosed today in the official count of the state highway commission.

The count was made at 23 stations for 12 hours on September 10. During the 12-hour period, it was reported, 8,793 passenger automobiles were counted. Of this number, 3,896 were from other states. The percentage of foreign to local cars was 43.7 this month as compared with 39.9 in 1929, 27.5 in 1927 and 16.6 in 1926.
