

Dr. Copeland, "Dragging" in Statistics, Points Out That It Isn't Such a Foolish Idea to "Go to the City for Your Health."

As a matter of fact the great cities are pretty safe places to be born and reared. My rural readers won't understand this. They will think of the open spaces, the out-of-door life, the fresh and abundant food of the country. Indeed, the average person, if asked for an off-hand opinion, would doubtless vote against the city as the place for health.

Statistics prove-please don't haugh! Whenever a debater wants to clinch an argument he drags in "statistics."

There are said to be three kinds of lies-lies, whoppers, and statistics! As a matter of fact, you can prove almost anything by statistics. But the laws of the various States provide

for the accurate collection and recording of "vital statistics." That is, the births, deaths and marriages are carefully recorded. Severe penalties are imposed for any neglect in these matters. Much as we may doubt statistics in general, we can find out exactly what the death rate is
