AMERICAN PRISONS VERY CROWDED NOW

Prison Handbook Shows Population To Be 124,788. Half Enough Space.

New York.—A survey of prisons, federal and state, in the United States shows a prison population as of January 1, 1929, of 124,788 the handbook of American prisons shortly to be issued by the national society of penal information will say. These prisoners, the handbook will say, are crowded into quarters in many cases, notably that of the federal prison at Atlanta, Ga., which were intended to handle only half of their present population.
