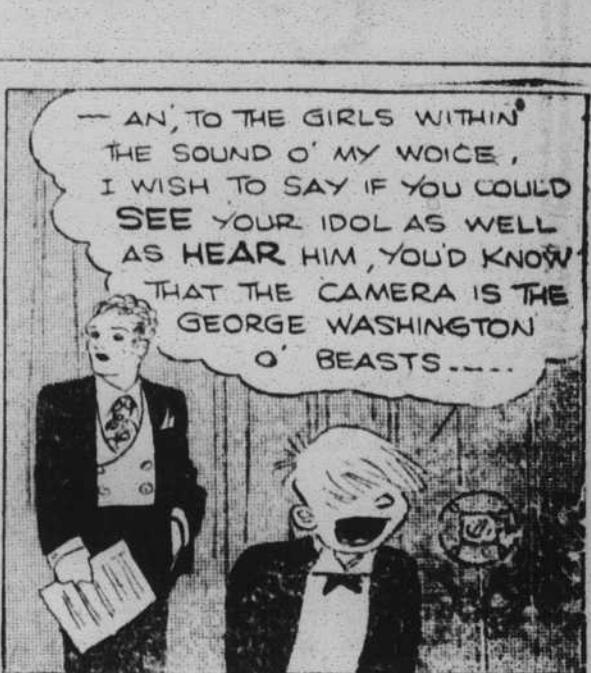

### LOCAL TEACHERS TO GET COURSES

Extension Work Of University Expected To Enroll 1,500 This Week. Chapel Hill.—Some 1,500 teachers in service are expected to enroll this week for courses to be given by the university extension division in 26 centers of the state, scattered all the way from Beaufort in the east to Canton in the west, according to an announcement made today by Russell M. Grumman, director of the university extension division. This is the ninth year that the extension division has undertaken teacher training service. This year the school of education is cooperating in the work. Dr. William J. McKee, of the education school, for three years a member of the extension teaching staff, was recently appointed director of the teacher training program of the extension division. In addition to his administrative and supervisory duties, he will teach extension classes at Salisbury, Spencer, Sanford, and Buie's Creek. In fact, all this year's teaching comes from the school of education. They will devote their whole time extension teaching and service to the schools. College credit and credit on teachers' certificates are obtainable through these extension courses. Prof. B. A. Stevens will teach at Shelby, two centers in Rutherford county, and at Maiden; Prof. Roy W. Morrison at Asheville, Hendersonville, Brevard, and Canton; Prof. Cecelia H. Bason, at Wilmington, Whiteville and Burgaw or Warsaw; Prof. Grace P. Woodman at Albemarle, Monroe, Wadesboro, and Hillsboro; Prof. Ernest H. Hicks at Washington, Williamston, Beaufort, and Stonefall; Mrs. C. E. McIntosh at Lumberton, Rockingham, and Fayetteville. Other centers will probably be added later. Resident members of the university faculty are called upon to teach extension classes in places accessible to Chapel Hill.

### Farmer Says Boll Weevil "A Blessing"

Has Seen Great Light, Says Union Man, And Will Fight Pest No More. Monroe Journal. Mr. D. R. Baker, World war veteran and farmer of Buford township, says he will fight the boll weevil no more. Never shall a bit of poison be put out on his farm. Three years ago Mr. Baker brought to the Journal office several stalks of cotton higher than his head with not a boll on them. The weevil had eaten them. He then regarded the weevil as the death angel that would slay agriculture in this section. Now he has changed his mind. "The boll weevil is the greatest blessing that the farmers have had," Mr. Baker said yesterday. "If there were no boll weevil now where would we be? What would the price of cotton be? What would the farmers be gaining for working themselves to death to produce a huge crop of cotton and get nothing for it? "We thought we could depend on cotton, but the boll weevil has proved that we cannot, so he's a blessing. No, I'm not going to quit cotton, but I am going to quit depending upon it. I now have some cows, some hogs, and some poultry, and will make what cotton I can. We can make feed and something to feed it to and the boll weevil will keep up the price of what cotton we do make."

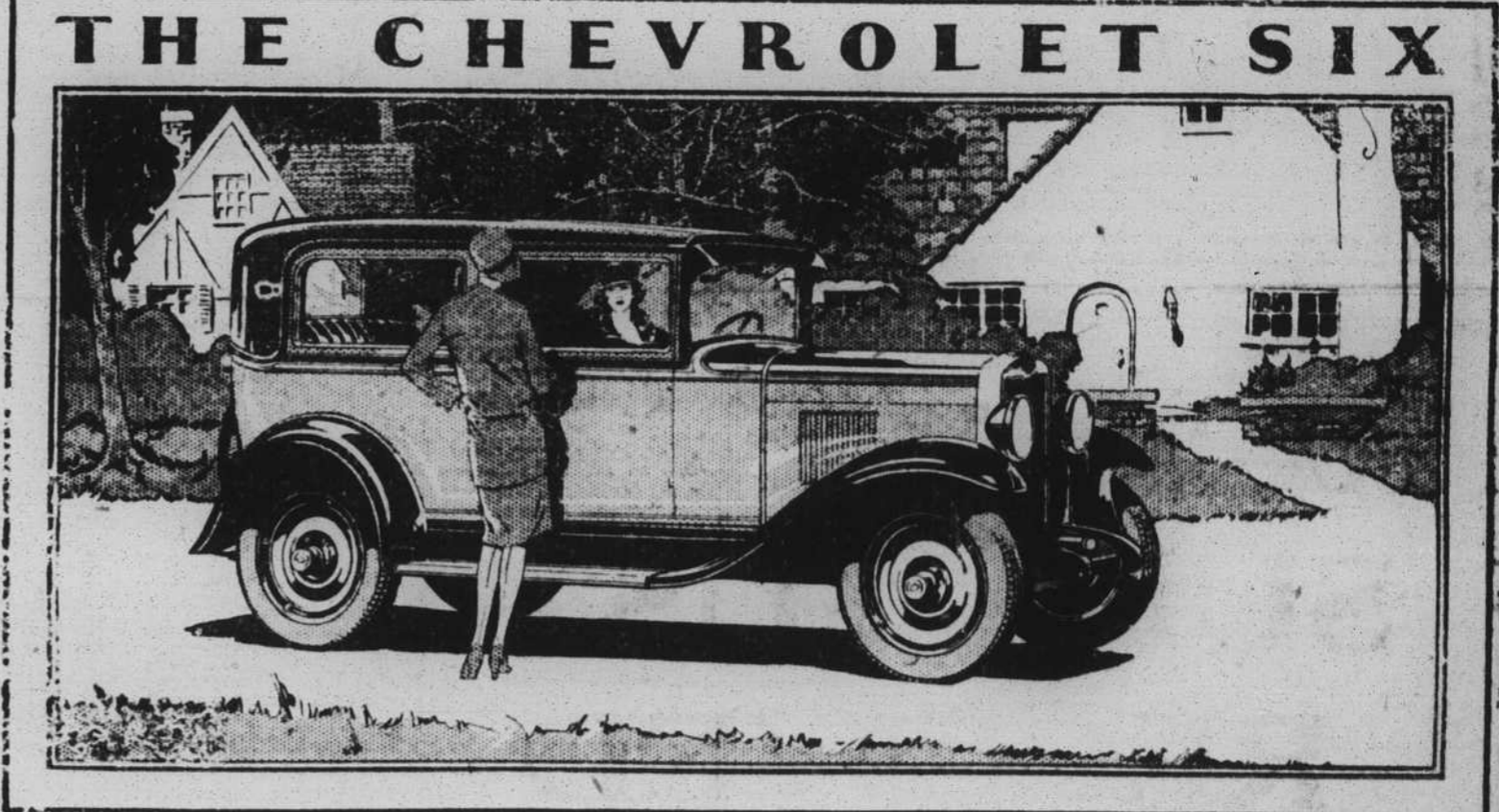
