Theoretically, there is no time at all of the training of a regimental band but regulations have been juggled a bit so the bands can learn to play marching tunes.

WISH IS FISHERMAN FOR WEST INDIANS

Washington.—"Set a thief to catch a thief."

West Indian anglers, according to H. W. Krelger, national museum ethnologist, may never have heard the old adage but went it one better by setting a fish to catch a fish.

There bait was the sucker fish, a creature with a powerful sucker developed on the upper side of the head which it naturally used to attach itself to other fish.

A sucker fish was captured alive, a cord tied to it, and allowed to escape until it became attached to a large fish. Both fish were drawn in by the tether, the captured fish disengaged, and the live bait set free again for another victim.
