Gettys Was Teacher, Legislator And A Sheriff In Rutherford

Editor Star:

The object of this communication to your column is to pay a deserted tribute to a good citizen whose loss of death has caused a universal spirit of sorrow to prevail in the counties of Rutherford and Cleveing two weeks in Lincolnton with land in the State of North Carolina. The subject of this sketch and the recent victim of the Grim Destroyer was Plato Gettys, a useful citizen of the famous Hollis region in Rutherford county, and of remarkable versatile talents. He was at one time, a zealous and conscientous school teacher, at another time a fearless and vigilant deputy sheriff; and also served Rutherford county as a wise and acceptable member of the legislature. He also featured as a progressive and successful farmer and a dairyman. He was a zealous and consistent member of Big Springs Baptist church proving himself useful by presence, counsel and financial support.

For a long time he was on couny board of education, and proved himself a man of foresight, executive and devoted to cause of popular uplift. He leaves a wife and several children in sorrow and bereavement; but provided for in material comforts. He was a firm but affectionate father and a devoted husband.

He was a descendant of the Scotch-Irish family of the 'anie name who came here in a colony from Pennsylvania and settled near Little Britain Presbyterian church about 150 years ago. These colonists comprised Longs, Fortunes, Andrews, Geftyses, McFarlands, etc. who exemplified Scotch skill and thrift in farming and Scotch devotion to the cause of churches and education.

The funeral of the late Mr. Plate Gettys was duly observed at Big Springs church, his pastor, Rev. Gordon Washburn and others officiating. Many friends and relatives were present; and the ample floral display attested the respect and eseem in which he was held. MELVIN L. WHITE.


