Reports were given from the fair. CREATES AN ARTIFICIAL AIR THAT SEEMS TO BE BETTER

> McPherson, Kan.-Air different from anything man breathes-yet which supports life in white mice more effectively than normal at-mosphere—has been made by Dr. J. Willard Hershey, a McPherson college chemist.

Finding of two new life-supporting atmospheres has come about as a by-product of Dr. Hershev's seven years' study of what part rare gases play in normal life.

Ordinary air contains about 212 per cent oxygen, 78 nitrogen and per cent of other gases. In one experiment helium was substituted for the 78 per cent of nitrogen.

"In a series of tests with this atmosphere," said Dr. Hershey, "it was found that the white mice were in a brighter, more active and a better, healthler condition than in normal air, so far as could be observed."

The mice also were tested in an atmosphere of 25 per cent oxygen and 75 argon. With this mixture, Dr. Hershey found the general conditions of respiration, appetite and rest better than in normal air.
