## LAW SUIT OVER HEN'S DEATH DEVELOPS COMPLICATIONS

The Toulouse court has delayed its verdict in the case of Pessant vs. Duminy for three months because each time it has come up for trial the defendant or the plaintiff has introduced supplementary action.

Last June Antoine Duminy was driving his automobile through a suburb of Toulouse when a hen belonging to Jules Pessant, a local horse-shoer, became confused at the headlights of the car, flew at them, broke one, and then died under the wheels.

M. Pessant demanded 50 francs, or \$2.04, as compensation. The motorist refused to pay on the ground that the hen had smashed his headlight. The two drove to a garage where the headlight was repaired for 52 francs, or \$2.12. Thereupon M. Duminy called upon the horse-shoer to pay him the difference between the value of the hen and cost of repairs, which was 2 francs.

The horse-shoer again declined and was sued for the 2 francs. When the case first came up M. Pessant lodged a counter claim for 150 francs, or \$6, on the ground that the slain bird was a fighting hen and that the eggs which would have been hatched were worth the amount claimed, minus the 2 francs. Thereupon M. Duminy instituted a supplementary suit claiming damages of 250 francs, or \$10, the cost of a new glass to his lamp and the danger incurred by using the repaired one.

## Observer Hopes To See Cleveland Rebuilt

Fires may come and take away one building after another, but the springs down at the foot of the shaded hill on the famous old Cleveland Springs property, at Shelby—that town has built out close to it in recent years—like Tennyson's brook—will flow on forever. The water stays just as in the days of the old stage coach, when South Carolina aristocracy reigned during the summer months. Not only the original springs, but the original house of pioneer days having been set to one side out of reach of the flames that have reduced two more modern structures to ashes. Then there's the golf links and the fine club house unburned, and to be sure a new and even more modern hotel building will be erected as the central attraction. The structure burned Tuesday night was completed about a dozen years ago, taking the place of the hotel that was built by Wilkinson, the eastern lumber man, and which enjoyed a popular run of custom before it blazed out one night. The Cleveland Springs hostelry has had a number of noted managers. McBryde Poston's reign was one yet fondly remembered. Then came Mr. Robert Miller, from the editorial sanctum to the hotel register—and everybody wanted to go back when Miller was there. In former years, Cleveland Springs was a summer resort, but in later

days it was developed, with the aid of a fine hotel, into an all-the-year-round resort and deservedly had profitable patronage. Shelby money and enterprise being back of it, we shall expect to hear shortly of architects being engaged on the new job.
