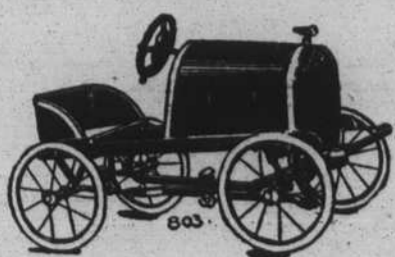

Former County Man Prospects For Oil In Robeson County

E. R. Smith And Partner Lease
 Several Thousand Acres In
 Lumberton Section.

Lumberton, Nov. 12.—E. R. Smith
 and G. Gillespie, of Fort Lauder-
 dale, Fla., oil prospectors, the for-
 mer once of Kings Mountain, have
 been in Robeson county for the past
 five or six weeks and have secured
 leases on several thousand acres of
 land in the vicinity of the Davis
 filling station, six miles from Lum-
 berton, Raft Swamp township,
 where oil has been flowing from a
 pump for the past several weeks.
 Some of the leases are on land as
 far away as six miles from the fill-
 ing station, it is said.

Finding oil at the pump at the
 filling station brought to the
 minds of several of the people of the
 community facts that lead them to
 believe there has been trace of oil
 there for the past 30 years. For
 years people have been having trou-
 ble with their pumps out there, after
 getting a yellowish sort of sub-
 stance that resembles the stuff that
 is being pumped out of the ground
 at the filling station. Recently many
 people have observed that some
 kind of oil has been on top of the
 small streams along Raft and Holy
 swamps. Some skeptical people have
 gone to the bottom of the streams
 and found leaves saturated with oil.
Burns Well.

The oil that has been coming from
 the pump is of orange color. It has
 a peculiar odor, at first smells of in-
 seed oil and then of refined kero-
 sene. It burns with ease, and some
 of the people of the community have
 been burning it in their lamps. The
 oil found in the streams and holes
 resembles that of the pump.

While there is great interest in the
 developments, there are many who
 are skeptical and are not yet con-
 vinced that there is oil in Robeson
 county. Many people from Lum-
 berton have gone out into the sec-
 tion and seen traces of the oil and
 are unable to explain where it comes
 from. The fact that the stuff smells
 of kerosene has caused many to be
 skeptical.

The leases which have been sign-
 ed, none of which have been re-
 corded in the office of the register
 of deeds of Robeson county, give
 the leasees the right to the land for
 oil-promoting purposes for a term of
 five years and as long after as oil is
 found thereon. The persons leasing
 the land furnished all equipment
 and do the drilling, and the lessors
 get one-eighth. It is proposed to
 start drilling about January 1.

Smith formerly lived in Kings

 said. Gillespie is said to be a retired

 experience in the oil industry, it is
 reported.
