TRAGEDY CAUSED BY "ACT OF GOD," ENGINEER STATES

Richmond, Va.—The Pennsylvania excursion train tragedy at Onley, Va., last Sunday was caused by an "act of God" and not by the negligence of the railroad or its employees, R. E. Steele, state corporation commission engineer, said following an official investigation.

Crystallization of the steel followed by contraction due to extremely cold weather caused the rail to break after but a few of the train's wheels had passed over the track, the engineer stated.

The wreck cost nine lives and caused the injury of 52 other persons.
