**ALASKA HAS LARGEST NUMBER OF PLANES**

Chicago.—Alaska of gold rush days has been lost in the wash of airplane propellers, and the territory leads the world in number of airports in comparison to its population.

For each 906 inhabitants there is an airport. From 30 to 50 per cent of the funds allotted to road building, the American Air Transport association reports, are going into the building of landing fields.

The reason, according to Governor George A. Parks, is that air travel means more to the territory than any one thing. Journeys that take four to six weeks by sledge or afoot are completed in less than seven hours.

ance of peace as a justification for a sweeping reduction of armaments.

Possibly the desirability of establishing such a precedent before the conference in a matter of such delicacy that taking a chance was dangerous. Unless it interferes with the peace negotiations between Russia and Manchuria the consequences will not be serious, but it is generally agreed that the well meant experiment was unlucky, and just now the state department seems rather on the defensive.
