Yet it has now become the leader in North Carolina. And it grows good cotton, commanding good prices. What is the explanation of this transformation.

Very largely it is explained by the faith, energy, enterprise and leadership of a citizen, who now has been placed in the Governor's mansion at Raleigh by the state of North Carolina. Max Gardner became convinced years ago that carefully selected secd, scientific methods of culture and well chosen machinery could produce good cotton and plenty of it in his county.

He was able somehow to bring about a like conviction in the minds of many fellow citizens on the farms of Cleveland county. They tried it out and the 1929 crop proves Gardner to have been right.

Of course, this county wide result was not achieved in one year nor two. But it has finally been done. The same principles of seelcted seed, scientific culture and the best up-to-date facilities applied to cotton or any other crop will accomplish the same result. Better fewer acres done properly and thoroughly than too much spread hasty superficial work.




