Mr. Harris is a member of the Methodist church, a York and Scottish Rite Mason and Shriner.

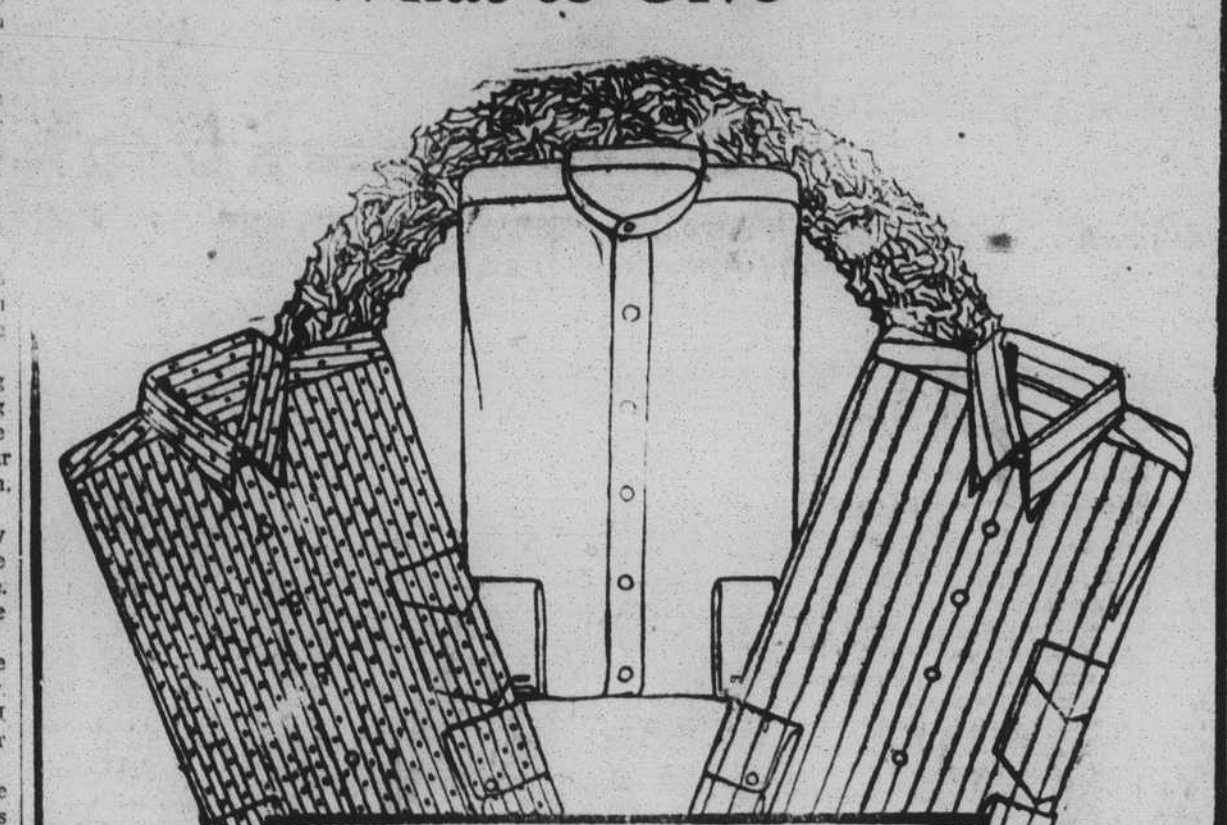
