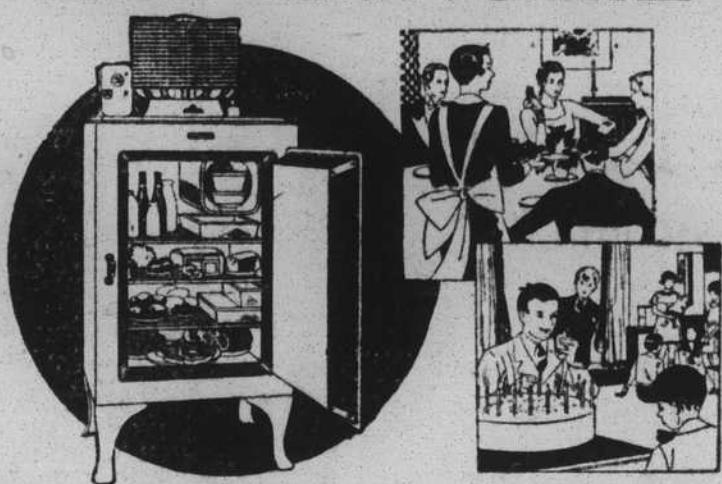

BAVARIANS FIGHT BEER TAXES BUT BUY TITLES

Munich—"Millions for titles but not one pfennig more for beer" might be used as a Christmas slogan in Bavaria this year.

Though the population is indignant over the threat of a two-pfennig increase in the beer tax to help the national budget, records show that millions of marks are unhesitatingly paid by citizens for inclusion in the "Christmas list" of new titles.

Although this is contrary to the

new constitution, the Bavarian state government persists in the lucrative custom of awarding high sounding titles of official rank, whose rolling syllables so delight the German sense of dignity.

"Geheimer Kommerzien Rat," or "Secret Commercial Counselor," is a special favorite and official figures show that this title in the 1928 Christmas list netted the government \$250,000 while the more prevalent "Kommerzien Rat" brought in \$400,000.

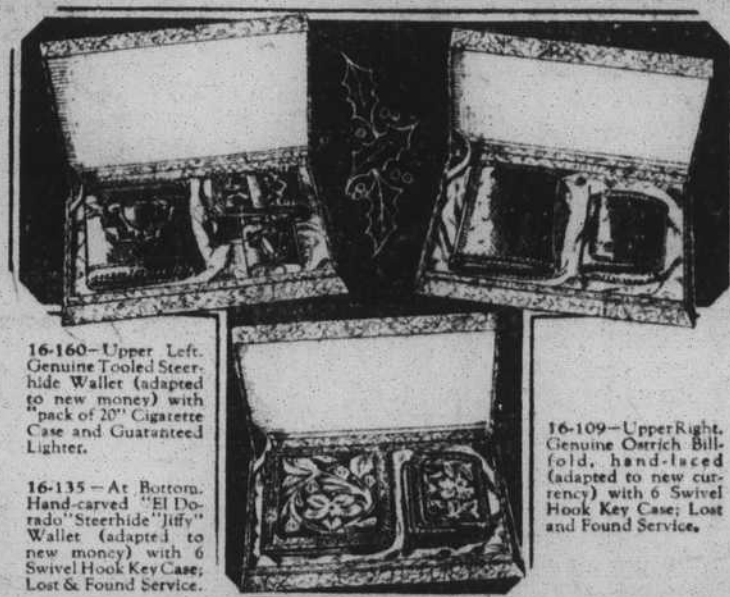
