Lattimore, Jan. 6.—The fast-stepping Lattimore high school boys' basketball team, in a double bill here Saturday night, winning each game by a rather decisive score. The boys won the opening game 34-15, and the girls handed out a 39-29 verdict in the night cap.

The Grover boys put up a hard fight and were in the lead during the early minutes of play. The local lads, however, featured by the work of Captain Weathers, soon forged ahead never to be surpassed again.

This team Weathers seems to have a monopoly on the high scoring honors at Lattimore this year; said it seems that he means for no dispute to arise in regard to the matter. So far this season he has been beaten only one time by any of the members of his own team, and that was by a margin of just one point. He has already caged a total of 81 points for this season. Brooks and Gold were the other luminaries for the locals.

Herndon led the attack of the visitors with 7 points. Mullinax also played great ball.

The local girls showed improved ability at passing the ball in their win over the visiting sextet. McEntire sunk a total of 23 points to capture honors for Lattimore, and Irvin was runner-up with 13.

Harrell, former local high school principal, has a strong team, having won the championship of McDowell county last year.
