HOME LIVING
For fifteen years we have preached home living (more hay, hogs, cows, chickens, etc.) live at home, and we believe this was done more and more up until just a few years ago, perhaps three or four or five years ago. We find for the last three or four years we have not lived up to (the live at home way) instead we have gone into the one crop way—cotton—which will get us all sooner or later.

In 1923 we made nearly three hundred thousand pounds of butter and in nineteen twenty-eight we made less than two hundred thousand pounds, and last year, nineteen hundred twenty-nine we made less than one hundred sixty thousand pounds.

We are informed that Cleveland County has a around 3000 less cows than in 1925. What does all this mean?

We also hear that our farmers will have to buy lots of hay, corn and other feed stuff this year and that the hog crop is very, very small.

We urge our folks to stop and think. See what some of our sister states have done with this one crop system. What has happened to them?

Let's get back to the live at home plan, raise our own feed stuff for man and beast, then a surplus to feed our Southern Cities—then go to the cotton, raise all we can, but make our living first and a little over for others.

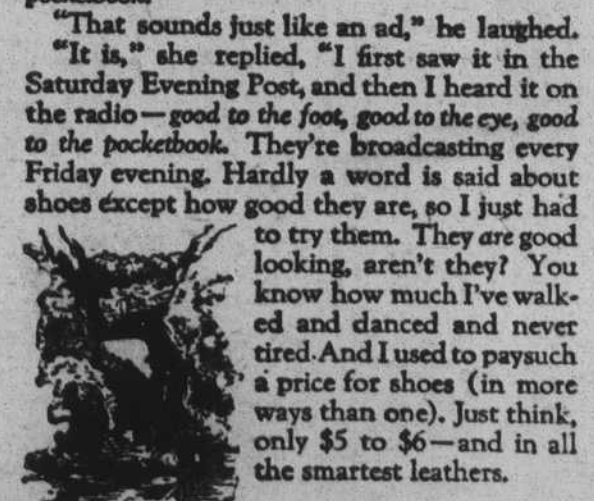
A SECOND HONEYMOON (A True Story)
