\$2.50 Dividend For Penney Co.
Directors of the J. C. Penney company declared an annual cash dividend on common stock of \$2.50 per share, payable on January 30 to stockholders as of record January 20, from earnings and surplus. E. C. Sams, president of the organization, announced today immediately following the meeting of the board. "This is an increase over the 1928 dividend which figured on the present basis after the split-up in stock, equalled \$2.33 per share."

The board further voted that, beginning with this year dividend should be put on a quarterly basis. It is contemplated that the first quarterly dividend will be paid at the end of March next. It is also contemplated that the rate will again be increased to \$3.00 per share, 75c quarterly.
