

Often the county ocmmissioners pass upon the cases and do not call upon the superintendent of public welfare for an investigation or report.

Investigation will often show that poor old man or woman could be better cared for in the home of a relative with a little assistance from the county. Often it will be found that there are relatives who are able to give their indigent kin a home, if they are reminded of their responsibility. 
