

### John Hastings Is Buried At Casar

Native Of The County Died At Newton. Was 53 Years Of Age. Five Children.

Toloca, Feb. 27.—A large crowd of relatives and friends gathered at the Baptist church on last Sunday to pay their last tribute of respect and to see the body of Mr. John Hastings laid to rest.

Mr. Hastings had been sick with heart and stomach trouble for several years and for the past year or so has been almost past working. He was taken to the Lincoln hospital on last Tuesday and died last Friday February 21. All was done that loving hands could do for him. He was born October 16, 1876 and was 53 years, four months and four days old. He was married to Miss Jane Newton, July 20, 1896. He leaves to mourn his going his wife and five children, Vernie, Lona, Onie, Amos and Fred.

His mother, three sisters and seven brothers, also a host of friends and relatives. He was a loving husband and father and a good neighbor. He will be greatly missed.
