Since then, career has swept him up to many climaxes, the last the peak of a lawyer's ambition, chief justiceship of the United States su preme court.


Once before he donned the somber robes of this court, but in those days he sat at the foot of the bench, appointed by the man whose place he now takes. Long before he became a public

figure lawyers knew of him as an adviser, and when New York city began an investigation of its gas companies Hughes was selected as its field marshal.

That successful fight started him on his public career. Soon he was governor of New York and re-elected in 1908. From this post he was called to the supreme court as an associate justice by Mr. Taft, then
