

**ELECTRICITY IN MILK, EXPERIMENTERS CLAIM**

Madison, Wis.—Suggested ad for milk dealers: "Charge your battery each day with a quart of milk!" H. H. Sommer and G. C. North, dairy specialists at the University of Wisconsin college of agriculture, say there is electricity in milk. Fat globules are negatively charged,

they say experiments showed. Adding lime salts and lime chloride reduce the potency of the charge; addition of sodium citrate and disodium phosphate strengthen it. The thickening of the cream line is due to the clustering of fat globules, the electrical charges of which have been weakened. Sommer & North said.
