Prison Fire Brought Home To N. Carolina

Asheville Citizen.

While the horror of the Ohio pen-
 itentiary fire, with its dreadful toll
 of 318 convicts burned to death, is
 fresh in our minds, Governor Gard-
 ner and Superintendent George
 Ross Pou are telling the people of
 North Carolina that what happened
 at Columbus Monday night could
 easily happen at North Carolina's
 central prison in Raleigh at any
 time.

Mr. Pou goes into details to show
 that the central prison at Raleigh,
 begun in 1909, is, because of its in-
 terior construction, "little short of a
 fire trap." Efforts have been made
 to provide such protection against
 fire as is practicable but the cost of
 making an old building like this
 fireproof would be an utterly un-
 economical expenditure of money.

What North Carolina urgently
 needs is a new and modern prison

plant to house those whom it has
 in its sovereign capacity deprived of
 their liberties. Mr. Pou figures it out
 that the money spent for a new pris-
 on would virtually pay for itself.
 But that is not the compelling argu-
 ment. The state should modernize
 its prison accommodations because
 it has no moral right to house con-
 victs under the conditions which it
 is now housing them under. The
 fact that the present prison is a
 fire trap is only one of the counts

against it. A modern prison, as Mr.
 Pou urges, should afford means for
 the segregation of the prisoners,
 separating the confirmed criminals
 from the first offenders, the pris-
 oners suffering from communicable
 diseases from those who are free of
 these diseases, and so on.

North Carolina is not the only
 state in which the prison system
 is antiquated and vicious. Similar
 conditions obtain all over the coun-

try but wherever they obtain their
 existence is a shame on the civil-
 ization of those who fail to provide
 a remedy. It was the public's char-
 acter of conditions of this charac-
 ter which superintendent Verner of
 Transylvania county had in mind
 when, at Charlotte the other day, he
 exploded his bombshell to the effect
 that education is overdone as com-
 panied to the emphasis put on the
 promotion of the general welfare.
