

Armour Plant Explosion Believed To Have Killed Many. Seven Known Dead.

Died In Blast

Think Fifteen

St. Joseph, May 8 .-- Fifteen persons, some of them women were be-lieved to have been killed late to-day in an explesion that demoliab-ca the smokehouse of the Armour and company packing .. plant ... in South St. Joseph.

Seven were known to he dead and nine injured. Three were known to be missing in the wreckage and of . ficials of the plant believed seven to nine others were trapped and kill-

The entire six story building was wrecked. It appeared as if the structure had been lifted and then settled down.

While the cause of the blast was undetermined, police and fire department officials advanced the theory that huge ammonia tanks in the building had exploded. Fumes Spread.

No fire followed the explosion but choking ammonia fumes spread through the wreckage gassing the rapped victims. A force of 35 girls was employed

on the fifth floor. Virtually all of them were beelleved to have left the building before it was torn asunder.


