to do themselves the credit of choosing him for their nominee in the primary three weeks from tomorrow. Simmons has been an incubus on the party far too long, and it will be a happy day for the state when he is retired from office. In the present political situation there are many factors that favor Bailey, and not the least of these is that he has the support of the organization. The great majority of the active political workers who were the chief source of Simmons' strength for more than a quarter of a century—the men who "get out the vote"—are now for his opponent. Even when he was leading an "independent" fight against McLean for the governorship in 1924, when the Simmons machine was all against him, Bailey made a creditable showing. Today the Simmons machine, in the old meaning of the term, no longer exists. Bailey is now the leader of a great army of regular thick-and-thin Democrats who stuck to the party when Simmons left it. Of course there are many good citizens who are going to vote for Simmons, but, generally speaking, his following consists of the fundamentalist, Ku Klux element. We do believe that the voters of this bent of mind are not sufficiently numerous—or, if so, not sufficiently well organized—to give him the victory. Few persons of any considerable standing are for Simmons. In every section of the state most of the Democrats possessing real influence are in the Bailey camp. Only two of the large newspapers

(the Charlotte Observer and the Winston-Salem Journal) are for Simmons. In the support of the press Bailey has a decided advantage. When Bailey first announced his candidacy his friends feared that he might suffer from the entrance of Republicans into the Democratic primary. But the fact that now the Republicans are to have a contest of their own has largely removed this danger. In the past they have had no primary voting to do and so have been free to "go over" and meddle with Democratic nominations. This year their inside-the-party rivalries will keep them at home. In 1928 Bailey supported Smith, and Simmons supported Hoover. Smith got 288,000 votes in North Carolina, Hoover 349,000. But of course most of Hoover's votes were cast by Republicans. If the vote for Seawell, the Republican candidate for governor, 289,000, be taken as the "straight Republican" strength, then the measure of the Democratic revolt against Smith was 60,000. That is to say, 288,000 Democratic voters in this state were on Bailey's side, 60,000 on Simmons' side. It appears highly improbable that enough of those 288,000 will switch over to give Simmons the victory in the primary. It is assumed that the vote will be much lighter next month than it was in the election of 1928; but if Bailey gets the votes of even half the Democrats who voted for Smith he ought to win by a good margin.

Low-Cut Dress Worn Long Ago

Cairo.—Selim Hassan, the Egyptian excavator, who has been digging on behalf of the Egyptian university near the Cairo Pyramids, has made a new discovery—namely that of the tomb of Tarso Ankh, which is the fifth tomb of a priest to be discovered in the great tomb of Ra Wer, a Prince and High Priest of the third dynasty (about 3,000 B. C.). Three statues of Tarso Ankh—whose name means a "Lover of Life"—have been found, representing three stages of his life, as a child, an adult, and an aged man. Another statue of the same priest has been found, with a statue of his wife on his left-hand side, and another statue of his two daughters, Gat Hor and Ara Marit. Their arms are linked in the affectionate manner of girls, and they are wearing décolletée dresses similar to evening dresses worn in the present day. There are two other statues of his first wife, wearing a sky blue dress with a necklace in relief round her neck. All the statues are complete, and in varied and brilliant colors. The discovery of the tomb of Ra Wer, which is described as a "town under the earth," with its roads and buildings, is of the greatest interest. The tomb was discovered at a depth of sixty feet, and the sarcophagus consisted of white stone, with its sides carved with inscriptions and designs. A notable design is that of a piece used for the playing of chess. The invention of chess has hitherto been claimed by two nations, Persia and China, and the question is now being asked whether this design does not indicate that the game originated in Egypt.
