Value Of Farm Crops In County Equal To \$222 Per Person. Cotton First, Dairy Products Second, Corn Third And Poultry Fourth. Interesting Farm Figures.

Cleveland County retains her position as one of the leading agricultural counties in North Carolina, and, also, as one of the wealthiest. The 1929 summary issue of the Farm Forecast, issued by the Department of Agriculture, shows that in 1929 the farm crops of this county, including dairy and poultry products, were valued at a little over eight million dollars.

The figures to be exact are \$8,-263.285. Cotton, of course, led the way as the most valuable of all the county crops despite the fact that the average price for the year was set at 17 cents. Dairy products ranked second, corn third and poultry fourth with wheat stepping inth fifth place.
