Easy Pastry Recipe.

Many cooks find the making of good pastry a difficult task, and consequently avoid making it as much as possible. The following recipe for short cut pastry is an easy

one to remember and makes a delicious crust. 1 C. pastry flour, 3 T. chicken fat or 5 T. other fat; 1-4 t. salt, ice wa-

Sift flour and salt, work in fat, if substitute for chicken fat is used. melt to the consistency of chicken fat, but it must not be hot. Use enough ice water to make a dough which will roll, Roll very thin. Handle as little as possible.


