4. I shall probably die a poor man, as worldly goods are counted, but I shall die with the knowledge that I am free from debt. I shall also carry with me the consciousness that I have done no man a wrong knowingly, and that I have always tried to live honestly and courageously.

Such property, real or personal or mixed, as I shall die seized and do devise, share and share alike, possessed, of any nature whatsoever present or prospective, I bequeath per stirpes, to my two nieces, Mrs. Myrtle (R. W.) Nowell and Mrs. Ruth (W. R.) Simpson, both of Hamlet, N. Retail Prices, As Usual, Not Falling With Wholesale Prices

Farmer Getting Low Prices For Product But Consumer Benefits Little.

Washington.—Retail prices of food have been coming down, but by no means as rapidly as wholesale prices. They never do.

When the farmer gets low prices for his products the consumer some times eventually gets a little of the benefit, but not until the middle man and the retailer get theirs, if then.

C. B. Denman of the federal farm board recently pointed to sharp declines in the prices of beef, dressed beef in Chicago, he says, has been selling for from 20 to 37 per cent less than a year ago, the greatest reduction being in the cheaper cuts. Retail prices for beef he assured all housewives ought to reflect the full reduction possible under present prices.

Doesn't Help The Housewife.
But none of the government's figures available here indicate that the housewife has been getting much of a break on sirloin or round steaks, or rib roasts or chuck roasts.

On a rough estimate, however, it is said that wholesale prices of food are about 10 per cent lower than the high mark last year and retail prices about 5 per cent. The monthly survey of retail food prices made by the bureau of labor statistics covers 22 of the most commonly used articles of food and its wholesale survey 121 items so no exact comparison is possible. The bureau depends upon about 1500 retailers for the information for its surveys, so it never compiles comparative wholesale and retail prices, which would make the retailers sore.

Retailers are reluctant to change their prices, either upwards or downwards, it is explained. Sometimes they feel that slight increases would be justified and yet fear to offend the consumer by making them. On the other hand, it is naturally much easier to refrain from cutting prices when wholesale prices drop. The retailers never notice lower wholesale prices as quickly as they observe whole prices.

Usually there are two steps between the producer and the consumer—the jobber, or middle man, and the retailer. The wholesale price, as commonly understood, is the price paid by the middle man. The middle man usually gets a slice during the inevitable lag between declining wholesale prices and declining retail prices, but experts on these facts believe the retailer usually gets the larger slice. The wide-awake retailer knows his price trends and he can make the middle man observe them easier than the ultimate customer can persuade the retailer to follow them.

Some blame is placed on the consumer, however, for increasing retail costs. It costs more to retail food now than it did. Time was when people bought potatoes by the bushels, flour by the barrel, apples by the peck, meat in huge chunks and eggs at least by the dozen. In these days of kitchenettes the retailer finds himself taking out two or three eggs or a single lamb chop at a time and flour, potatoes, apples and such food are bought often in one-pound lots.

Corn Good In East.
Fine prospects for a good corn crop are reported from all parts of northeastern Carolina by county farm agents. In some counties the acreage has been increased by 40 percent this season.

DISTRICT HEALTH OFFICERS WOULD REDUCE EXPENSE

Laughinghouse Thinks Graduate Nurse In Each County Would Improve Departments.

Raleigh.—While it may be too much of a financial burden for some of the smaller counties of the state to employ a full time health officer and maintain a complete county health unit, every county in the state should at least employ one graduate nurse, and can afford to do this, since in many counties a good nurse can do almost as much work as could a full time physician, according to Dr. C. O. H. Laughinghouse, state health officer.

In fact, Dr. Laughinghouse believes that the most efficient way to administer public health work in North Carolina, is to organize this work by districts, rather than by counties, with the various counties bearing their proportionate share of the expense and with only one health officer to a district, and with the work in the various counties being done entirely by nurses. This plan will reduce the cost to the counties almost by half and still not sacrifice any efficiency, Dr. Laughinghouse believes.

There are at present 52 counties in the state in which there is not now any county health unit in operation some of the counties frankly do not want a county health unit, while others cannot afford a county health department. But virtually all of these counties could afford to maintain a public health nurse, supply her with an office and transportation, and this nurse could do almost as much as a regular health department, in the opinion of Dr. Laughinghouse.

Many letters have been received from persons in these counties with out county health units, asking how some sort of public health work may be had in them. In reply to one of these letters, from a physician in one of the counties, Dr. Laughinghouse wrote as follows:

"Your county, while unable to afford a whole time health officer, and a complete personnel for a health department, can easily and should afford a nurse to do nothing but public health work. We are finding this plan in small rural counties with limited wealth for taxation exceedingly practical. The plan is to procure the services of one or more graduate nurses who have had training in the specialty of public health work. The medical societies in the counties where they carry on are all unanimous in the agreement to permit them to vaccinate against smallpox, typhoid, diphtheria and whooping cough. They are also permitted to gather together the midwives in the county and teach them how to be socially if not surgically clean; what not to do; and how exceedingly necessary it is to direct their patients to physicians when any evidence of distacia occurs.

In addition, these nurses carry on prenatal classes and sometimes take blood pressure and make examinations. Whenever they find a woman not in the pink of condition they prevail upon her to go immediately to the family physician. In this way confinement cases are directed to the profession, rather than to the midwives. Opportunities to give service in prevental care is afforded the physicians through

"In addition to this, the nurses go through the schools and find what appears to them to be physical defects, which defects are recorded, brought to the attention of the parents and the children are urged to go to the physicians in the county for such medical and surgical treatment as will make them physically whole.

"Lastly these nurses train the public to avoid patent medicines and other types of quackery, and train them to have profound respect for and confidence in the practitioners of regular medicine."
