Mrs. W. R. Gary, Fallston, first grade. Miss Ruby Carpenter, Maiden, music. There is no reason why Fallston should not have a better school than it has ever had. If progress is to

be maintained, this year must be better than the last. The spirit of the faculty is unselfish and progressive, and is backed by the highest type of rural citizenship. The school has its duty in imparting knowledge, but the spirit of the age has placed other responsibilities in the scope of the school. It is responsible now as to what its students do with the knowledge imparted. To many people education means merely increasing the power to make money. This is a function of the school, but one of the lesser functions. The real function of education is to develop a citizenship that will be able to gain ever increasing control of its surroundings thus maintaining a self-sustaining, happy, and equitable relationship to God and humanity. An educated citizenship will never be endangered by either capitalism or radicalism, the two extremes which ought to be avoided in any social order. American Democracy strives to strike a happy medium. The administration of education in Fallston looks toward the ultimate aims in education as well as to the immediate aims. The teaching profession is becoming the most powerful force in the social life of America. That body of more than a million has not become fully aware of its tremendous possibilities and oppor-

tunities in molding the destiny of American civilization. The leaders of the profession are striving to inculcate an altruistic spirit in this vast body of men and women that will always lead youth aright in the building of a civilization that will perpetuate itself. The faculty of Fallston school does not have clock watchers, but attempts to do its best for the children under its instruction. It tries to visualize the citizenship that it is helping to mold while considering the responsibility a sacred one. It attempts to maintain a high professional spirit of service even when criticism comes, because a teacher of children can not afford to indulge in selfish controversies to satisfy personal feelings. Teachers must be sympathetic with all children, and none must be considered bad. It is in this spirit that the faculty of Fallston school approaches another year of service in a splendid community.
