Gardner Nominates Byrd For President

Dick Byrd Is Welcomed To Monticello As Brother Harry Is Boomed

Charlottesville, Va., Aug. 10.—Richard Evelyn Byrd was welcomed as Thomas Jefferson guest at Monticello Saturday afternoon but his brother, Harry Byrd, Virginia's former governor, almost ran away with the party when a boom was informally launched in his favor for President of the United States.

Governor O. Max Gardner, of North Carolina, started it by concluding his address welcoming Dick Byrd with a brief nomination of Harry for President. Several seconds followed, one by brother Dick himself and another by Harold G. Campbell, superintendent of New York city high schools.

Brother Harry was standing far back under Monticello's east portico and he had to be dragged forward to bow to the audience amid thundering applause.

Negroes Nabbed For Store Break

Stolen Goods Worth About \$500 Recovered

York, Aug. 8.—The chance taking of an automobile license number by a young man near Sharon last night led to the arrest in North Carolina this afternoon of two negroes alleged to have broken into the store of W. L. Hill at Sharon, and the recovery of virtually all of the stolen merchandise, amounting to about \$500.

The negroes, who are said to have confessed their guilt, are Curtis Cuthbertson, arrested 10 miles from Lincolnton, and Refour Sanders, captured in Gastonia. A third member of the party has not yet been arrested.
