Mr. Sears, according to County Agent John Anderson, cultivates 43 acres of tobacco, but he also has 45 acres of good corn, seven acres in sweet potatoes, one and one-half mediately ahead, but there should be acres in sorghum, four acres in soybeans for hay, a large home garden and is now fencing fice acres of corn, soybeans and sweet potatoes
