Bailey Jumps "Miracle Man"

Trinity.—"How has the miracle man fallen!" exclaimed Josiah W. Bailey, Democratic senate nominee in referring to President Hoover in an address at a mass meeting here.

"President Hoover declared in his message to congress in December, 1929, 'The pledge of farm relief has been carried out,' declared the speaker, in pointing to the failure of the president.

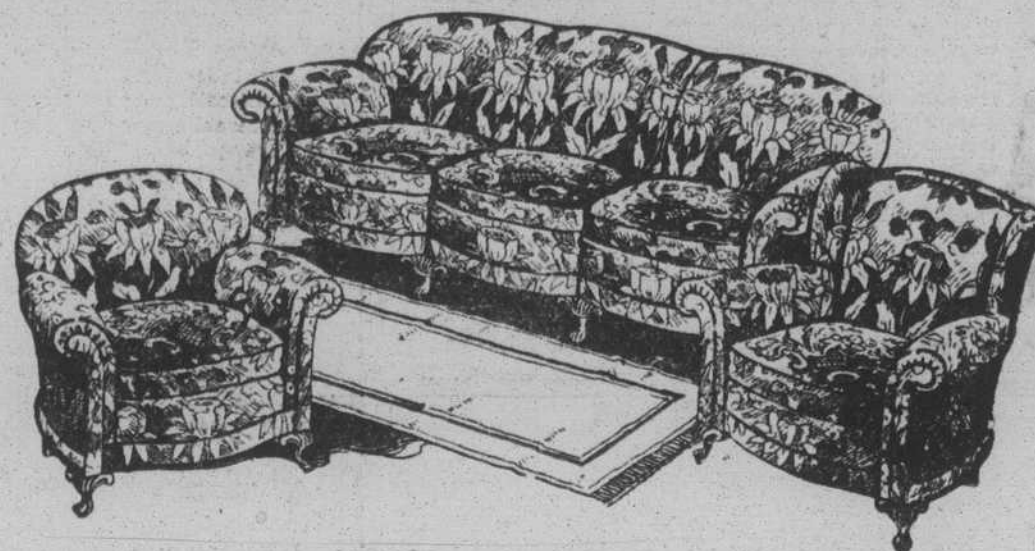

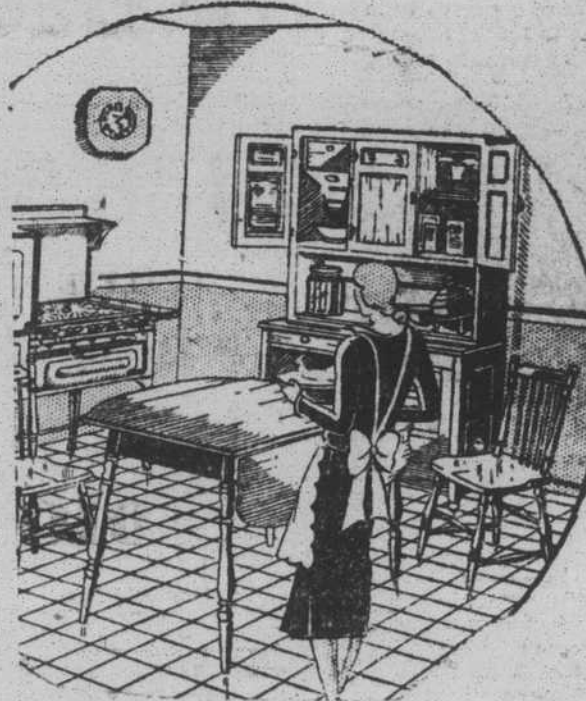

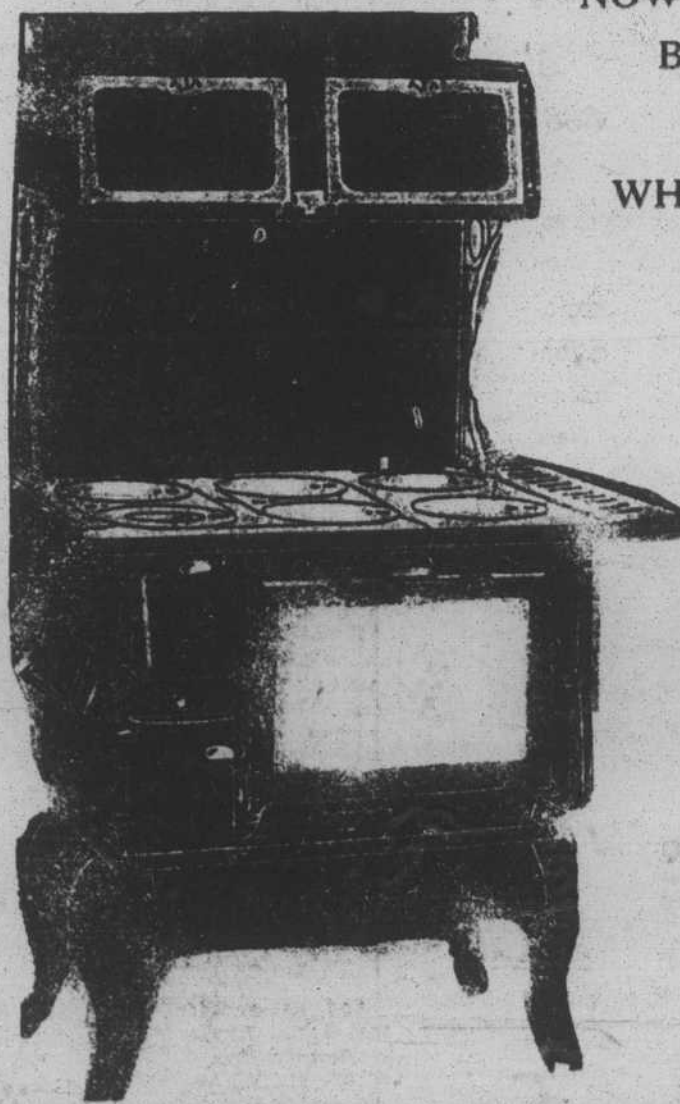
