New fixtures are being built with new display counters and cabinets under plans and specifications drawn by an expert in retail hardware. Every attention is given to space-saving, attractive display of merchandise and convenience of arrangement of stock, so that when completed, this will be one of the neatest and most attractive retail hardware stores in the Carolinas. A removal sale has been under way since October 9, conducted by a

dynamic advertising and sales expert in the person of Jake Thomas. Mr. Thomas has also been supervising the remodeling of the new store for W. A. McCord and Son, W. L. McCord, the owners of the Shelby Hardware Co. The new places will be occupied November 6th when representatives will be here from factories making various lines sold by this firm. They will demonstrate these lines during the two day formal opening.

#### Majestic Puts New Refrigerator Out

Pendleton Receives First Shipment of New Electric Refrigerators Made by Majestic.

After almost a year of piling rumor upon rumor, about the manufacture of a new electric refrigerator, Majestic has emerged into public view with a new machine that is said to sell from \$100 to \$150 less than any other electric refrigerator of its size on the market. This announcement does not come unexpectedly, for the refrigeration industry has been expecting a cheap refrigerator from Majestic now for several months.

Pendleton's music store, already exclusive agents in Shelby for Majestic radios, has the agency for the new Electric Majestic refrigerator. Line production of the new refrigerator by Grigsby-Grumow began September 30. Production plans now promise a yield to supply the demands that have recently been effected by placing the new product on the market. In appearance, the new Majestic is very much like a phonograph in style, is made entirely of steel and is finished in white enamel. No hooks are used to support themselves, which are held up by knobs that make for easy cleaning. A combination of fibre board and "Dry Zero"—three inches thick—gives insulation. The upper cold compartment holds two trays, each with the capacity of 21 ice cubes. When the separators are used, the lower compartment holds 42 more ice cubes. The separators, of course, are removable for freezing desserts.

The motor and pump are both hermetically sealed in a pressed steel bell housing and when in operation is next to be noiseless. The unit is so compact that it is only 9 1-4 inches in height. There are two models of the new Majestic refrigerator. In depth, over all, both models are the same, 27 1-3-16 inches; in the larger machine the height is 59 inches and the width 33 11-16, while the smaller model is 54 5-8 in height and

#### Davidson and V. P. I. To Play On Saturday

It Will Be Home Coming Week. Outcome Will Determine the Strength of Davidson.

Davidson, Oct. 23.—Davidson college and V. P. I. will reopen their gridiron rivalry on Richardson field at Davidson college next Saturday afternoon when the Gobblers and Wildcats play before a home coming crowd for Davidson. It will be the first time the two elevens have met since 1923, when Davidson was nosed out 7 to 0 at Blacksburg, Va. The year previous Davidson played one of her greatest games to tie the Gobblers 7 to 7 at Davidson. Incidentally, this will be the second time that Coaches Younger and Tilson have coached teams to play against their Alma Mater. Younger attended both Davidson and V. P. I., so his feelings will not be as decided as those of Tilson, who spent four years on the V. P. I. campus. These two men took a Wildcat eleven to Blacksburg the first year they coached at Davidson.

Meeting V. P. I. next Saturday means that the Wildcats will meet Virginia elevens on successive week ends. Following the Gobbler tussle, the Presbyterians will begin a four day period of training for the V. P. I. cadets, whom they engage at Lexington on November 1st. The meetings with the latter have been frequent since the regime of Coaches Monk and Tex began at Davidson. After the V. P. I. game next Saturday, some idea of the comparative strength of Davidson and the University of North Carolina will have been formed, for the Gobblers met the Tar Heels in an early season clash. They showed great form on the offensive that gave them three touchdowns over the Carolinians, although the Tar Heels tallied twice as many touchdowns.

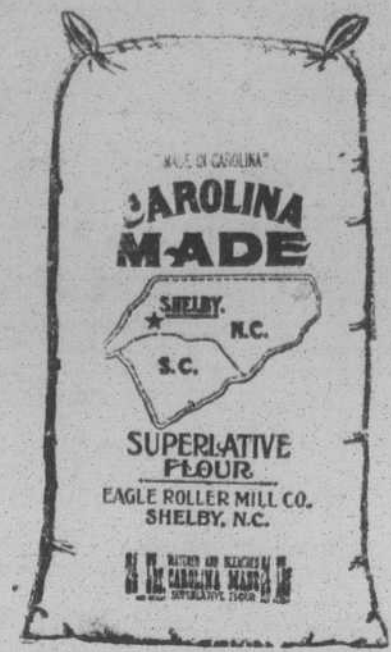
#### Hoey Speaks Eleven Times Before Nov. 2; Closing Campaigns
