GIRLS, YOUR LEGS REVEAL CHARACTER

Plumpness, on the contrary, indicates exactly the opposite. A girl with plump calves would be the one to choose if you wanted to enjoy a pleasant evening.

My studies at the Fox studio convinced me that the chorus for "The Golden Calf" is well nigh perfect. I

found rounded knees and slim artistic legs predominant, indicating that all are considerably above the average in intelligence, artistic and talented.

Road Bids Received By Highway Board

Probably Award of Road Contracts in North Carolina on November 13th.

Raleigh, Nov. 7.—The North Carolina Highway commission will meet in Raleigh November 12 and, among other duties, will probably award to the low bidders the three projects on which bids were received yesterday.

The three projects include grading and surfacing 5 1-2 miles on route 60 in Watauga county, Nebo Teer Durham; low bidder, \$62,337, widening to 30 feet route 10 in Guilford county from Greensboro city limits to the county home; 1.2 miles, low bidder, Murray Construction Co., Knoxville, Tenn., and Greensboro \$33,306.20; and paving two miles on route 48, Northampton and Halifax counties from Garysburg to the Weldon bridge, low bidder, Powell Paving Co., Winston-Salem, \$40,318.

Nineteen other projects have been prepared for a letting December 3, in which the total cost will range between \$1,250,000 and \$1,500,000. Federal aid will be used on all of these projects.
