### Hudson Factory Puts 3,500 Men To Work

The Hudson Motor Car company, makers of Hudson and Essex cars, added another 1,000 men to its working force today, making an additional 3,500 men put to work in the past three weeks, and in line with this policy to afford immediate employment to as large a force of wage earners as possible, William J. McAnaney, president, today gave out the prices at which the new Hudson and Essex models will be sold. They are the lowest prices in the 22 year successful history of the manufacturer.

The best list price of the Hudson, which will be known as the Greater Hudson Eight, will be \$675. The new Essex Super six will be sold as low as \$595. Thus, Mr. McAnaney points out that his company is offering its few product at a saving of \$175 on the Hudson and \$170 on the Essex, as compared to the prices when new models were introduced one year ago and takes full recognition of the obligation to give the public every advantage in value and, at the same time, provide employment for a large number of workers.

### America Of Old Of Asiatic Stock

Tells Philosophical Society Research In Alaska Indicates Migration To Continent.

Philadelphia.—Dr. Ales Hrdlicka, widely known anthropologist, told the American Philosophical society that five years of intensive research in Alaska had led scientists to believe that prehistoric man on this continent was of Asiatic stock. Dr. Hrdlicka is curator of the division of Physical Anthropology, National Museum, Smithsonian Institution, Washington.

"Since 1926," Dr. Hrdlicka said, "intensive anthropological and archaeological work has been carried on by the Smithsonian Institution in Alaska. The object of this work is to locate and save, so far as possible, the oldest remains of man that may be found, both skeletal and cultural; and at the same time a study is being carried on of the remaining fullbloods, both Eskimo and Indian.

"The chief aim of the present studies has been to discover, so far as possible, data of value relating to the old migrations from Asia to America. It is now definitely known that the American population was not indigenous and must have come, and that in fairly recent (post glacial) times, from Northeastern Asia; but material proofs of this were hard to secure.

"The work will take several more years to finish. Its extension to Asia is imperative."

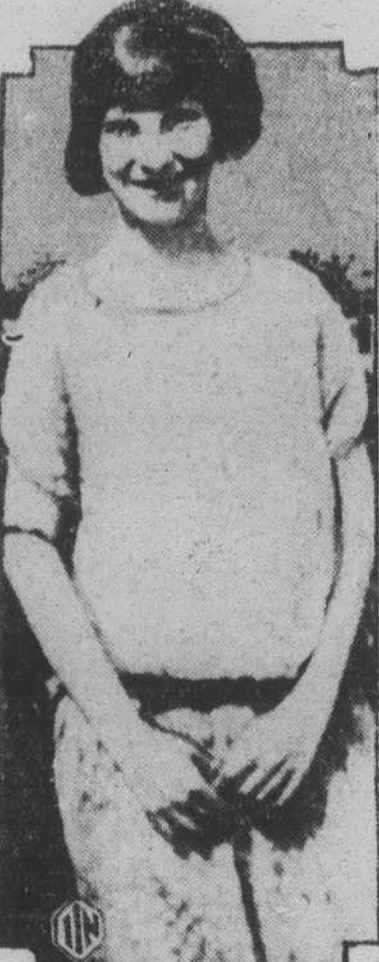
