Hollywood.—All the misty-eyed movie fans who have waited with awful expectancy for the day when Ramon Navarro will say adieu to Hollywood and don the monk's cowl, can cheer up and smile.
 According to his own statement, that monastery yarn was spun into tapestry by a press agent who let his horses run wild over the track of imagination.
 Navarro's home is ornamented with ancient religious relics, altars and tall candles so that he may imagine himself to be in a holy atmosphere when the mood wills. He is a strange personality, a mixture of incongruities—the heart of an actor and the soul of a saint.
 Perhaps that is why many of his friends regard him as a genius. At any rate, he cannot be compared with an ordinary movie actor. Recently he has tried to shake out his "recluse" reputation by appearing at midnight parties where there is a frequent clinking of glass and the cocktail shaker make a rainbow on the ceiling.
 But it is quite evident that Ramon doesn't like whoopee.
