**Founded By English
Over 250 Years Ago**

Charleston, South Carolina is more than two hundred and fifty years old. The city was founded in April of 1670 by a group of English colonists under grant by Charles II, in whose honor the settlement was later named. Other settlers came from the Bahamas and the Barbadoes, and late French Huguenots and Palatine Germans fleeing from the Bahamas and the Barbadoes to the population of what first was called Charles-Town. The influence of the early English, French and German settlers has remained through the generations in customs and architecture.

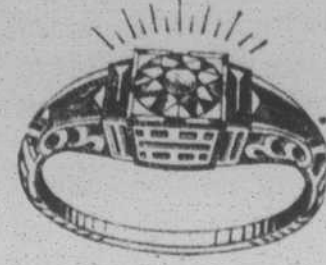
