In Hollywood**

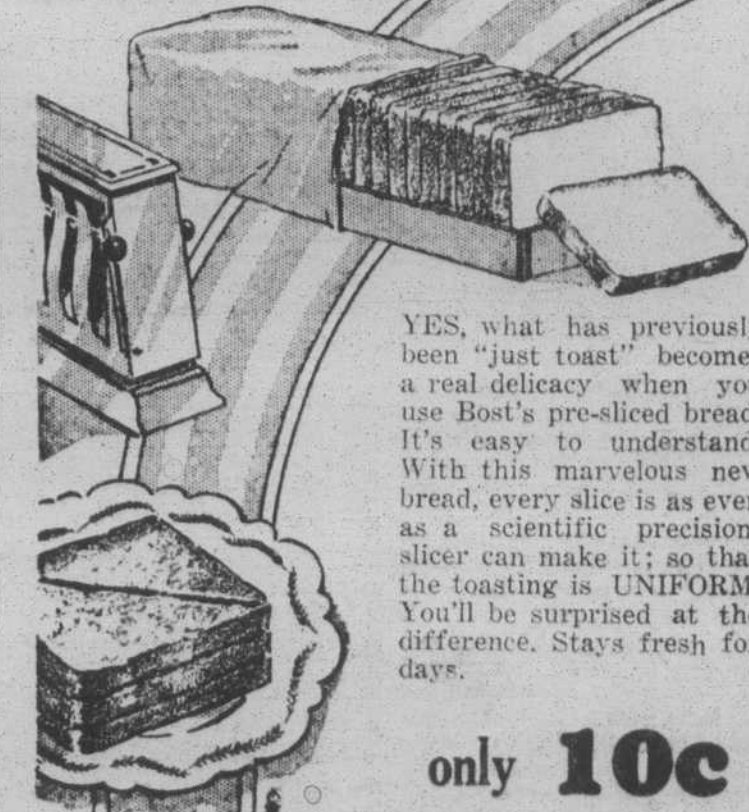

Following up its campaign for fresh  
faces on the screen, Warner Broth-  
ers have appointed Ivan Simpson,  
veteran stage director, to coach the  
young people whom Rufus Le Maire  
expects to discover on scouting tours  
through schools and amateur dra-  
matic societies.Mr. Simpson is a person of more

many years, acting as stage director
