American Army Gets Together

On Monday the 25th of September 1780 hundreds of patriots assembled at Sycamore Shoals in what is now Tennessee. Some 400 Virginia troops came under Colonel Campbell. Colonel John Sevier arrived with 240 gallant men. Colonel Isaac Shelby also brought 240 heroic soldiers and Colonel Charles McDowell was there with his 160 North Carolinians. These sturdy mountain men had but one object in view—they were determined to find and defeat Colonel Patrick Ferguson.

But why were these frontiersmen so eager to fight the British commander? In the first place, he had North Carolina. In the next place, he had rallied the Tories and numbers of the loyalists had joined the army of the enemy. And, finally, he had made a threat which aroused the patriotic backwoodsmen to heroic action. When Colonel Ferguson paroled Samuel Phillips, a distant relative of Colonel Shelby, he sent a verbal message to the leaders of the Watauga and adjacent settlements that "if they did not desert from their opposition to British arms, he would march his army over the mountains, hang their leaders, and lay their country waste with fire and sword." Such a warning would have probably had a terrifying effect upon some people, but it had no horrors for liberty loving men who had the courage to live in a wild region largely inhabited by bears, panthers and Indians. So when the day arrived for the gathering of the clans, more than a thousand bold patriots assembled at Sycamore Shoals to offer their services for the cause of freedom.

On the morning of September 25, the little army was ready to take up its march over the mountains and through the forests. However, before this important mission was begun the blessing of Providence was fervently asked upon those who were to be engaged in the patriotic enterprise. Rev. Samuel Doak, the pioneer clergyman of the Watauga settlement was present and invoked the protection of the Heavenly Father upon the brave little army. With a few stirring remarks befitting the occasion the good message of the Whigs go forth with the "Sword of the Lord and Gideon." The men leaped upon their rifles in an attitude of respectful attention and at the close of the inspiring talk to which they had listened they shouted in patriotic fervor: "The sword of the Lord and of our Gideons!"
