New York, Jan. 28.—The New York American today said Walter P. Chrysler, automobile magnate, has taken out life insurance policies totalling \$12,000,000, the largest amount ever issued to an individual.

The policies were issued by five companies within the past month, the American said. Pierre S. Du Pont, manufacturer, previously had insured with policies aggregating \$7,000,000.

Congress Will Cost U. S. \$23,957,000
