**McSwain Claims Bill  
Democratic Measure**  
To Editor of The Star:  
I have not seen a copy of The Star this week, but have been informed that there was a statement in the paper to the effect that the bill I introduced and passed in the senate to consolidate certain offices into one and make it an elective office was in accordance with the principles of the Republican party and not Democratic.  
I yield to no man in my love, devotion, and loyalty to the Democratic party and the principles for which it stands. I have always been taught that the Democratic party stood for the right of the people to rule and govern themselves; and that the power to appoint men to public office was autocratic and not Democratic. I thought Thomas Jefferson, the patron saint of our party, settled that question with Alexander Hamilton years ago.  
In representing Cleveland county in the general assembly I shall at all times stand for those measures and things which I think the majority of our people favor. If I did not do that and instead proceeded to represent certain interests contrary to public opinion, I would not be worthy of the honor the citizenship of the county has conferred upon me.  
I know that at least ninety per cent of the people of Cleveland county are in favor of this bill. It has passed the senate, and it is now up to Mr. Edwards in the house as to whether or not it becomes a law. I have done all I can do.  
I do want to say that in advocating this bill that I have no personal feelings toward any man whose office it affects. I am prompted only by a desire to save some money for the taxpayers of the county and to give the people the right to elect their county officers. If that is Republicanism, then I have been wrong all these years.  
I trust that you will do me the favor to publish this letter in full in Friday's issue of The Star this week.

**Roche-feller Gives  
A Quarter Million**  
New York.—The New York chapter of the American Red Cross announced today that John D. Rockefeller, Jr., had contributed \$250,000 toward the fund for the relief of drought sufferers.  
Mr. Rockefeller's gift brought the total contributions to the New York chapter to \$992,986.38. The chapter's quota has been set at \$1,500,000.  
Among other contributions today was \$10,000 from the Commonwealth and Southern Power company, which was announced by C. E. Groesbeck, chairman of the committee in charge of solicitation among electric light and power companies.  
Of this gift, \$2,000 is for the New York quota. The rest goes to chapters in territory where the company operates.

**Agriculture In  
High School;  
Ways It Helps**

(Written for The Star by E. L. Dillingham of No. 8 Consolidated school.)  
Twenty ways in which the agricultural department may help the community:  
1. Conduct evening classes on topics of most interest to local farmers.  
2. Give advice and information on pruning and spraying home orchards.  
3. Help in the selection and planting of varieties of fruits suitable for the home orchard.  
4. Making plans for the improvement of home grounds.  
5. Give methods for the controlling and prevention of poultry diseases.  
6. Give demonstrations on poultry culling.  
7. Encourage and assist in the purchase of pure-bred stock.  
8. Suggest the best formulas and amounts that will pay best on the main crops.  
9. Vaccinate hogs for cholera.  
10. Formulate balanced rations for all classes of live stock.  
11. Furnish plans, blue prints, and information on the building of poultry houses, sweet potato storage houses, soda crushers, mixers, and all other farm appliances and buildings.  
12. Promote sale of car lots of poultry and the cooperative buying and selling of farm commodities.  
13. Demonstrate the laying off and building of terraces.  
14. Suggest the best crop rotation.  
15. Help plan water systems for the home.  
16. Clean and treat all kinds of seed.  
17. Give best methods for controlling insects of all crops.  
18. Give methods for treating oats, wheat, potatoes and other seed.  
19. Select and encourage the use of soil improvement crops.  
20. Select suitable grass mixtures for pastures and lawns.  
Ten ways in which patrons of the school can help the agricultural department:  
1. Acquaint themselves with the activities and objectives of the agricultural department.  
2. Encourage boys to have good projects by carrying out all the approved practices possible.  
3. Discuss the different jobs with the boys and give them the results of your years of experience.  
4. Discuss your problems with the agricultural teacher—both when learn.  
5. Attend all agricultural meetings which are held for the benefit of farmers.  
6. Encourage thrift and wise investments.  
7. Encourage competition between boys in project work.  
8. Offer prizes for those boys who excel in their farm work.  
While these factors are not given as a complete summary of all the vocational department in the community can and is doing to aid the farmers and farm boys, it is sincerely hoped that they will serve as a means of promoting a more sincere and cooperative spirit between the department and the citizens of the school community.  
It is extremely difficult to get the farmers and boys to realize the importance of keeping records on their projects work. This is necessary for at least two reasons: first, no other First, there must be some way of checking up on the expenditure of the funds which are appropriate for this work. Second, in order to find out if the approved practices which are advocated by the department are more profitable than the original practices.  
At a time of agricultural depression like this every agency which has been set up to aid the farmer should be utilized. Therefore, every farmer should acquaint himself with his local department and join hands with all the fellow farmers in an effort to carry out the progressive and economical measures which have been proposed.
