Hunting Season Closes This Week

Changes Are Proposed Before The Legislature In Raleigh, Squirrel Season Closed. Saturday of this week marks the formal closing of the hunting season for most of the game existing in this section. The official date for closing the season on quail, rabbits and possums is February 15, which falls on Sunday, so Saturday will be the last day on which hunting will be legal for the 1930-31 season. The reason for squirrel shooting closed on January 1. Just when the shooting seasons for various types of game will open and close next time is a matter of uncertainty. Legislative action in the form of amendments to the state game law may result in some changes, while the state board of conservation and development may make other changes under authority granted them by the legislature both as to hunting and fishing regulations. Last Thursday a bill was passed through the house advancing the open season on squirrel shooting to September 1. This was pushed by eastern members of the house.

North Carolina Opens Road Bids

Raleigh, Feb. 9.—The largest highway letting in North Carolina in about three years, according to highway commission officials, will be opened here tomorrow when bids for projects expected to cost about \$1,640,000, will be opened. The letting is the first of four scheduled to enable North Carolina to use its share of federal-aid funds, including almost \$2,000,000 allotted as an emergency measure to relieve employment. Contracts contemplated in the four lettings will aggregate \$4,500,000.
