


Youth's Leap to Fame

14,000 Acres Of Forests Burned

Asheville. — Fourteen thousand thousand acres of timber lands in 10 western North Carolina counties have been burned by 1,168 forest fires since January 1, W. K. Biechler, district forester, announced.

The actual damage to timber was estimated at \$37,000, with the cost from loss of seedlings and future erosion impossible to determine, he said. The counties are Buncombe, Cherokee, Clay, Haywood, Henderson, Jackson, Macon, Polk, Swain and Yancey.

Additional thousands of acres were burned in McDowell, which is not in Biechler's district.

Boyd Willis Dies; Belwood Freshman

Young Man Only 17 Years Of Age Succumbs In Shelby Hospital. Buried At St. Peter's.

A large crowd was present for the funeral service that was held at St. Peter's on last Monday at 11 o'clock for Mr. C. Boyd Willis. He was born July 8th, 1913 and died in the Shelby hospital, where he had been a patient for some time. On Feb. 15th, he was 17 years, 7 months and 7 days old. Boyd was a good boy and was loved by all who knew him. He was a freshman in Belwood High school but was compelled to give up his school work on account of failing health. Flower girls were cousins of his, Misses Annie Mae Warlick, Mrs. Lee McEntire, Thelma Warlick, Aline Vaughan, Harry Lizzie Warlick, and Inez Vaughan. Funeral services were conducted by the pastor, Rev. E. E. Snow. The esteem in which he was held was shown by the beautiful flowers that covered the new made grave.
