his successor, was seeking to keep it a secret. His secretary, however, knew that he was not returning, and was anxious to know who his successor would be. So it happened that a morning paper reported and an afternoon paper reported arrived in the executive counsel's office at the same time. The secretary, seeking the picture of Mr. Edwards with its "Succedes Mull" caption on the front page, immediately jumped to a very logical conclusion and said enough before she found out what the picture was all about to completely let the cat out of the bag. The morning newspaper reporter had nothing to do for a front page story but to inform the governor that the fact that Mr. Mull had quit was then public knowledge. The governor immediately announced that Judge N. A. Townsend would take over the office temporarily, and the whole story was out.

college and many pastors of the three associations who attended. All expressed their determination to work as never before, not only to keep the school going but to make it one of the outstanding junior colleges of the south.

Optimistic Now. Dr. Zeno Wall, acting president of the college, stated today that the spirit of the meeting was magnificent. "To me it appears," he said, "that we are just now on the threshold of building a real college, one whose influence in educating and moulding the lives of young people will be felt more than ever before. Heretofore our churches have been giving liberally to outside causes, a portion going to the college. Yesterday we decided that this section populated by hundreds of Baptists, many of them well fixed with material things, will first of all see that our school is what it should be and then give to other schools and institutions. We hope next year to have a real school man, one with ability and character, to head the institution and work with Dean Huggins in building up the institution." J. H. Quinn, chairman of the board of trustees, was equally as elated over school prospects after the meeting Tuesday. "We just decided that we could not let Boiling Springs falter. Then we added to that," he said, "the determination to make it go forward instead of faltering. There is no reason why Boiling Springs, with all the surrounding high schools of this section turning out hundreds of pupils yearly, should not grow and prosper. If the enthusiasm exhibited yesterday holds with us, and I believe it will, Boiling Springs is headed for greater things."

### Missing Lincoln Farmer Kidnapped

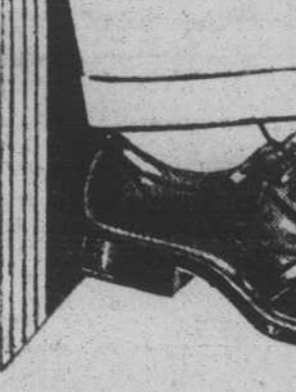
Walter Ballard, Missing Since Last Thursday, Says He Was Spirited Away.
